Staffing and technology challenges persist as crime rises in Santa Monica

Serious crime in Santa Monica increased by 10 percent in 2022 with aggravated assault, robbery, and car theft fueling the rise.

Part 1 Crimes also include burglary and larceny and the preliminary 2022 total for the category was 4,719, up from 4,300 last year but still below 2018's total of 5,441.

SMPD said that while robbery calls increased by 47% last year to 231, the total was still lower than pre-pandemic levels and that enhanced patrols in the downtown area are helping further reduce incidents.

Car thefts were the largest driver of crime last year with an additional 121 incidents last year (for a total of 541). SMPD said the crime is a regional scourge motivated in part by the spread of information on social media targeting specific models that lack anti-theft technology.

Burglary at businesses declined in 2022 but burglary of homes increased. Theft of personal property, known as larceny, increased due almost entirely to shoplifting. Overall larceny calls increased by 251 incidents with shoplifting accounting for 231 of those. Theft from vehicles also increased while bicycle theft decreased.

Less serious crimes, known as Part 2 (including DUI, public intoxication, simple assault, weapons charges, drug and fraud) increased by 21 percent but are still far short of pre-pandemic levels. Part 2 crimes increased to 3,216 last year, up from 2,668 the year before. According to SMPD, Part 2 crimes peaked recently in 2019 at 4,535.

Simple assault cases, defined as an attempt to cause fear or intimidate (without physical harm), increased by 161 incidents to a total of 742. SMPD said those figures were on par with pre-pandemic levels. Weapon charges hit a five year low of 24 in 2020 and have since increased to a total of 54. Narcotic arrests almost doubled from 123 in 2021 to 228 last year. SMPD said they had success in decreasing fraud cases by sharing tips that helped residents, particularly the elderly, avoid gift card or banking scams.



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

Everything you need to know about the 2023 Academy Awards

Hollywood is gearing up for the 95th Academy Awards, where "Everything Everywhere All at Once" comes in the lead nominee and the film industry will hope to move past "the slap" of last year's ceremony. Here's everything you need to know about the 2023 Oscars, including when they are, where to watch the live show and this year's controversies.

WHEN ARE THE OSCARS?

The Oscars will be held Sunday, March 12, at the Dolby Theatre in Los Angeles. The ceremony is set to begin at 8 p.m. EST and be broadcast live on ABC.

CAN YOU STREAM THE OSCARS?

The broadcast can be streamed with a subscription to Hulu Live TV, YouTubeTV, AT&T TV and Fubo TV. Some of these services offer brief free trials. You can also stream the show on ABC.com and on the ABC app by authenticating your provider.

WHO'S HOSTING?

Jimmy Kimmel will host for the third time and his first time since 2018. That was also the last Oscars to feature a solo host. The show went hostless for several years after Kimmel's last outing. Last year, Regina Hall, Amy Schumer and Wanda Sykes hosted as a trio. In an ad for this year's show styled after "Top Gun: Maverick," Kimmel made his humble case for being the right person for the job while noting that he can't get slapped because "I cry a lot."

WHAT'S NOMINATED FOR BEST PICTURE AT THE 2023 OSCARS?

The 10 movies competing for best picture are: "All Quiet on the Western Front," "Avatar: The Way of Water," "The Banshees of Inisherin," "Elvis," "Everything Everywhere All at Once," "The Fabelmans," "Tár," "Top Gun: Maverick," "Triangle of Sadness," "Women Talking." Here's a guide to how you can watch them.

WHAT'S IN STORE FOR THE SHOW?

The Academy of Motion Pictures Arts and Sciences is yet to announce presenters. But it has said that winners to all categories will be announced live on the show. (Last year, some categories were taped in a pre-show, something that caused an uproar among academy members.) Nominees for best song are often performed, though nothing is confirmed yet. This year's nominees include Rihanna's "Lift Me Up" from "Black Panther: Wakanda Forever," Lady Gaga's "Hold My Hand," from "Top Gun: Maverick," and Kala Bhairava's "Naatu Naatu," from "RRR."

WHO ARE THE FAVORITES?

Daniel Kwan and Daniel Scheinert's indie sci-fi hit "Everything Everywhere All at Once" comes in with a leading 11 nominations. Close on its heels, though, is the Irish friendsfalling-out dark comedy "The Banshees of Inisherin," with nine nods, a total matched by Netflix's WWI film "All Quiet on the Western Front." Michelle Yeoh ("Everything Everywhere All at Once") may have a slight edge on Cate Blanchett ("Tár") for best actress. Best actor is harder to call, with Brendan Fraser ("The Whale"), Colin Farrell ("Banshees") and Austin Butler ("Elvis") in the mix. In the supporting categories, Angela Bassett ("Black Panther: Wakanda Forever") and Ke Huy Quan ("Everything Everywhere All at Once") are the frontrunners. Steven Spielberg ("The Fabelmans") may win his third best director Oscar, though the Daniels could also pull off the upset.

WHAT'S BEEN CONTROVERSIAL THIS YEAR?

Aside from the usual snubs and surprises, this year's biggest to-do has been the debate surrounding Andrea Riseborough's unexpected nomination for best actress. Riseborough was nominated for the littleseen Texas-set drama "To Leslie" after many A-list stars rallied around her performance. When two other best-actress contenders — Danielle Deadwyler ("Till") and Viola Davis ("Woman King") — were snubbed, some saw that as a reflection of racial bias in the film industry. The academy launched an inquiry into the star-studded, grassroots campaign for Riseborough but found no reason to rescind her nomination.

WHAT ELSE SHOULD YOU LOOK FOR?

Just the reading of the title to one of this year's short film nominees should prompt a wave of giggles. John Williams ("The Fabelmans"), up for best score, is the oldest nominee ever, at 90 years old. After historic back-to-back best-director wins by Chloé Zhao ("Nomadland") and Jane Campion ("The Power of the Dog"), no women were nominated this year for best director. Also don't expect to see Will Smith at the Oscars anytime soon. After striking Chris Rock at last year's ceremony, Smith was banned by the film academy from attending for 10 years.

The Dangers of Up Zoning in Santa Monica

Dear Editor:

On February 22nd the Santa Monica City Council will consider whether or not to take the recommendation of the Planning Commission and submit an application to the State of California to modify the Santa Monica approved Housing element so the city can avoid Up-Zoning all commercial districts uniformly.

What's at stake for residential neighborhoods: Main Street, Montana Avenue, Ocean Park Blvd, Pico Blvd.

Look at Main Street in Ocean Park, for example, it falls into the category of the Neighborhood Commercial Zone (NC Zone). It currently allows for base heights of 32 ft for buildings. The new Housing Element would allow building heights to effectively double, (and if there is a 100% affordable housing project that height can increase by 33% more). What would happen if Main Street is up zoned to have 55 -85 feet tall buildings?

First, this is not a solution for homelessness or for affordable housing. There's no guarantee these 5-8 (?) story buildings will have an affordable housing component, chances are they won't. How else would a developer make any money? By the way, the population of Santa Monica is growing marginally, and Ocean Park in particular, already is greatly diverse economically, with rent control throughout the neighborhood. And what about the existing small businesses on Main Street? Gone overnight. Parking? Traffic? Stand on Main Street from 4 pm - 7 pm and experience the existing evening traffic jam... maybe a few private equity firms just come in, buy up chunks of Main Street and forever transform the neighborhood. Main Street will devolve into Any-Town, USA.

People seek out Santa Monica, and in particular, Ocean Park from all over the state, the country and the world. Main Street, Ocean Park is beachside living. Its very character and identity connotes the sound, smell, feel and sight of the Ocean, along with a Sunny, Sunday stroll on Main Street. Nobody came here, either 60 years ago or today to live, work and walk in the shadows of 85 foot tall buildings. The entirety of Main street from Bay to Pier could one day be in the shade everyday after 1 pm. So much for the very essence of what draws people here in the first place. So much for the quality of life for existing residents.

City Council should protect existing residents and our residential neighborhoods. They should stand up & negotiate with the State. The city should seek to preserve the NC zone and protect the character, charm & appeal of Santa Monica. They should submit an application to modify the Housing element to avoid Up-zoning all commercial districts uniformly.

Pattons was acquired by Pharmaca which in a short time sold out to Medley. Medley, evidently is bankrupt and sold out to Walgreens, a corporate behemoth who demonstrated quickly and tragically their lack of care and concern for their employees and customers. Within 48 hours last week, without notice, the staff was let go sans medical benefits and all prescriptions were transferred to Walgreen at 20th and Wilshire. I am urging all Santa Monicans to boycott all Walgreens stores and find a local pharmacy which cares about you and your family.

High Speed Rail

Early proponents of the high speed rail project withdrew their support once the route was announced. It was clear from the beginning that travel times between San Francisco and Los Angeles were excessive, and so ridership would be low.

What would work? Changing the alignment, and running the high speed rail line from Redding to Bakersfield. It would provide true high speed rail along flat ground, and would serve as an economic catalyst as the central valley diversifies away from agriculture (due to diminishing water availability). Existing construction would be preserved.

It could serve as the central element of a grand bargain: the central valley complies with all environmental improvements, including reduced water supplies, and in return gets the high speed rail line.

Since the high speed rail line would stimulate economic growth in the central valley, state and local tax revenues would increase, justifying the investment.

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

UCLA receives \$20 million to establish Goodman-Luskin Microbiome Center

A \$20 million gift from Andrea and Donald Goodman and Renee and Meyer Luskin will fund a new center at UCLA focused on the microbiome and its effect on health.

Investigators at the new center will study the microbiome's role in disease prevention and the body's immune response.

The enterprise will be led by Elaine Hsiao, UCLA's De Logi Professor of Biological Sciences.

Among the most promising areas of scientific inquiry is the study of the human microbiome and its effect on health. To fuel more rapid progress in this field, Andrea and Donald Goodman and Renee and Meyer Luskin have made a \$20 million gift to establish the UCLA Goodman–Luskin Microbiome Center.

Research at the center will focus on the microbiome's role in disease prevention and the body's immune response with the goal of developing new treatments for a range of conditions including inflammatory bowel disease; obesity and eating disorders; neurodevelopmental and neurodegenerative diseases, such as autism, Alzheimer's and Parkinson's diseases; irritable bowel syndrome; and substance use and psychiatric disorders. There are also gender differences in the microbiome.

"The Goodmans and Luskins have been enduring supporters of UCLA Health's mission to heal humankind and we are deeply grateful for this visionary gift," said UCLA Chancellor Gene Block. "This is an investment in our distinguished researchers and their ability to find new pathways that advance patient care."

The microbiome is composed of the microbes — bacteria, fungi, viruses and their genes — that reside in and on our bodies.

Microbial organisms in the human gastrointestinal tract, commonly referred to as the gut, are essential to human development, immunity and nutrition. Autoimmune diseases, such as diabetes, rheumatoid arthritis, muscular dystrophy, multiple sclerosis, and fibromyalgia are all associated with dysfunction in the microbiome.

Scores of investigators at the UCLA Vatche and Tamar Manoukian Division of Digestive Diseases and across the campus are working to "fingerprint" the brain and gut microbiome to elucidate the role microbial diversity plays in resistance to disease, and whether lifestyle interventions can reduce the risks for and symptoms of chronic diseases.

"Further study of the relationship between the microbiome and the brain is critical," said Dr. Steven Dubinett, interim dean of the David Geffen School of Medicine at UCLA. "We extend our heartfelt appreciation to the Goodmans and the Luskins for their commitment to this innovative field."

Donald Goodman is the president of Don Lee Farms, a multigenerational family food company he founded in 1982. The company produces food products for the country's top retailers, including Costco, Trader Joe's, Whole Foods, Sam's Club, Walmart, Kroger and Albertsons. He and his wife, Andrea, have been recognized by the Los Angeles Regional Food Bank for their longstanding philanthropic efforts, and by U.S. Rep. Maxine Waters for their support of scholarships for exceptional high school students in Inglewood, California.

"Renee, Meyer and I have had a friendship that spans back to my childhood," Donald Goodman said. "Meyer and I later served together on UCLA Health's Advisory Board for over a decade. His insights and leadership have been an inspiration for me.

"It has been incredible to see the tremendous impact of UCLA's scientific advances on the health and well-being of so many people. This gift reflects our families' dedication to fostering innovative research that will continue to enhance health care."

Renee and Meyer Luskin earned degrees from UCLA in 1953 and 1949, respectively. Meyer Luskin is an industry leader in the business of recycling and processing food waste. In 2011, the couple made gifts to name the UCLA Luskin Conference Center and the UCLA Luskin School of Public Affairs.

"Our families have witnessed the profound difference philanthropy makes in research and the development of new treatments," said Meyer Luskin. "This pioneering center will help scientists expand their knowledge about a wide range of diseases and find cures. For us, this is an investment in the future of medicine."

Geffen School of Medicine scientists collaborate on microbiome-related research with faculty members from the UCLA Samueli School of Engineering, the UCLA Fielding School of Public Health, and the UCLA College divisions of life sciences and physical sciences.

The gift funds a new headquarters in the UCLA Center for Health Sciences to support collaboration among numerous labs and brain-gut investigators engaged in seven focus areas. Elaine Hsiao, UCLA's De Logi Professor of Biological Sciences, will lead the comprehensive enterprise. In 2022, Hsiao was one of three researchers nationally to be recognized by the New York Academy of Sciences with a Blavatnik National Award for Young Scientists.

The gift also funds a fellowship to train and mentor physician-scientists, an early-career research fund to support promising scientists, an endowed chair in brain-gut-microbiome research and an annual symposium — all aimed at fostering a fuller understanding of the brain-gut-microbiome interface and its role in human health.

"The center's initial focus on brain-gut-microbiome research will build on our existing strengths and advance UCLA's collaborations with other microbiome research centers across the nation," said Dr. Eric Esrailian, UCLA's Lincy Foundation Professor of Clinical Gastroenterology and chief of the division of digestive diseases, which is ranked No. 3 in the nation by U.S. News & World Report.

"This is only the beginning, and we appreciate the friendship and generosity of the Goodman and Luskin families as we explore this incredible scientific frontier.

SAMOAS:

I hate shredded coconut but somehow still like this cookie. A feat of engineering.

Despite a nightmare-like appearance, they're not bad. That said, you have to like coconut...and I'd expect them to have a stronger aroma given the amount of coconut in them.

Very flavourful and fun! Nice subtle hint of coconut and chocolate.

Luxurious in both taste and mouthfeel but can become too sweet.


Love these! I'm biased as this has been a staple for a long, long time. But have you tried them frozen? 10/10

As one of the three original girl scout cookies, the timeless flavor and satisfying crunch play out perfectly with the mint and chocolate flavor. Having an airy and light crunch to them, there are not many ill things to say about this confection.



TAGALONGS:

A near perfect cookie. Great balance between peanut butter and chocolate, creamy yet crunchy.

I do like peanut butter...but, the texture of these is such...well, it's not crunchy and I kinda like crunchy. Cookies should be crunchy.

Great cookie. Perfect texture! Great mix, of smooth, buttery and crunchy!

It's a classic and the perfect chocolate/peanut butter pairing.

Given how much I love peanut butter, these are like a little taste of heaven. A perfect ratio of chocolate to peanut butter. That said...did I mention how much I love peanut butter...so you know, there could always be more of that.

Seeming good in theory as a basic cookie, the tagalong is for the peanut butter lover. For those who don't favor the overwhelming nutty flavor, this is not for you. Both the texture and taste of the peanut butter overwhelmed the cookie base and the chocolate.

You have to really like lemon to enjoy these, but you know, I do, so that's good. A tad crunchier than expected, but that was also a pleasent surpise.


A pleasant surprise. I had low expectations and now I can't wait to buy a box!

the department at the Feb. 14 council meeting.

He shared that while the department was understaffed throughout the year, officers responded to an increased number of calls for service, response times were faster and officers made more arrests than the year before.

He also reported that the number of calls related to homelessness was on the rise, gave an update on the department's drone as first responder program and conveyed his desire for the city to invest in more advanced technology to aid officers in the future, especially leading up to the 2028 olympics.

STAFFING

The SMPD is budgeted for a total of 182 full duty sworn officers, however, Bautista said he has about 39 positions unavailable due to various factors including injury, family leave, light duty assignment, academy training or vacancy. The department's professional staff, who can be deployed to carry out public safety assignments, community service work, traffic service and harbor patrol, is also down by approximately 31 employees who are currently unavailable.

Bautista said that 28 new officers were hired in 2022, an increase from the previous few years, but added that he would like to be able to hire even more, with a goal of bringing on 40 new officers in 2023. However, even with these hiring efforts, he said he thinks it will take time before there is an actual increase in the total number of officers on staff due to officers simultaneously leaving the force.

"This is balanced against the fact that we know folks are going to retire," he said, noting that approximately 53 current SMPD officers will be age-eligible to retire in the coming year. "It is very challenging to fill the ranks and to get to where we need to be as officers begin to fall off and go on long term injury or they're getting ready to retire."

He said the department is trying to be proactive in addressing the problem.

"The fact that the City manager and the City management team allow us to continually hire for those vacancies and to look at over-hiring in some cases for our roster vacancies, gives us the ability to stay essentially on par with what we're losing," he said.

Bautista said that ideally he would like to have 250 officers by the 2028 Olympics.


CALLS FOR SERVICE

Bautista reported an overall increase of calls for service last year from 101,040 in 2021 to 104,061 in 2022. However, there was a decrease in the number of these calls that came from citizens and an increase in calls initiated by officers.

Bautista also noted that the majority of the calls the department received were classified as priority three and four calls, which are the lowest level of urgency.

"These are nuisance type calls: a loud party, a general disturbance, loud music, someone randomly yelling and screaming walking down the road or trespassing calls," he said. "Priority three and four calls take up the lion's share of the calls."

The department received 839 priority zero calls, reports of the most life threatening crime incidents. Bautista shared that the department had significantly cut down the time it takes for officers to respond to

Bautista said the department needs to develop a Crime Information Center that can integrate CCTV, license plate readers and 21st century mapping technology.

"We cannot we cannot continue to attempt to thwart today's crime with yesterday's technology," Bautista said.

He said upgrades are necessary to help provide information to the public and help make strategic decisions.

"I was in our crime meeting recently and came to learn that our crime mapping function has been inoperative. Our crime analysts are doing their best. We're using Google Maps and dots on the map to illustrate where the crime hotspots were occurring. This method is one step above paper pin maps I was using 30 years ago. If we are to protect our community, we need to have the latest suite of products that in an instant, in an instant can visualize the data and tell you what's up, what's down and where it's happening," he said. "The same goes for our police department's transparency web portal. At any given time we should be able to tell the public how many calls for service we've taken with the crime rate is how many people we've stopped, who they were and if they were arrested where they were released."

He added that he sees technological improvements as a "key component" of being prepared for the 2028 olympics.

"We will test license plate readers in our downtown area and we will bring Live 911 online in 2023," he said. "This software allows our officers to hear the 911 caller live as you're speaking with the dispatcher and so often we don't know exactly what's going on. This feature helps us build better context into the response. So in an emergency, we are safer and better prepared to serve the public. And we will have a new computer aided dispatching system online this year, replacing the nearly 30 year old system that is currently in place."

He said SMPD will start sharing a software system with the Office of Emergency Management that will track the progress of 911 calls in real time so callers will know when an officer is dispatched to their incident.

Bautista license plate readers are being installed around the city this month.

"What we're testing out here, hopefully in the next few months, is going to be a concentric ring of license plate reading cameras that are in the downtown area. So we'll be able to tell if a criminal comes in, commits a crime we'll be able to figure out more than likely, at what point he entered the city and then what point he got into downtown, and then especially what point he left and then what direction he went."

He said the department is implementing two systems to review video footage that will help free up man hours and said a recent case required all SMPD detectives spend hours watching video to identify a single car.

"You take out 15 detectives to watch 36 hours of video. You have to look for one blue car and figure out what time it came in and what time what happened around it. And while they're doing that, our property crimes continue to pile up. They keep coming in and they're not being worked. And so there is software out there that will focus on what I'm wearing, not what I look like it will focus on the color of the car and within minutes, give us a response as to what we're looking for," he said.

Part I and Part II crimes, which include the most severe crimes such as homicide, rape and aggravated assault, both increased in the City in 2022. Part I crimes were up by 10% from 2021 and Part II crimes by 21%.

However, Bautista reported that arrests by officers were also up significantly, at 53% more in 2022 than 2021.

"They thwarted thievery and robbery, they caught arsonists literally in the act, they spoke to people on the street, they conducted traffic stops that yielded suspects that were carrying stolen property such as mail theft, catalytic converters," he said. "They confiscated illegal weapons, firearms without serial numbers, and they identified countless persons with serious out of state violent felony warrants for crimes such as aggravated assault, homicide, and sex offenses. Through the officers' work these criminals were transported back to their home states to face criminal prosecution."

HOMELESSNESS

In 2022, SMPD officers responded to almost 20,000 calls relating to homelessness and nearly 1,900 calls about homeless encampments, an increase of 1382 and 250 calls respectively from the previous year. Despite this, Bautista shared that the Homeless Liaison Program (HLP team) was "severely understaffed."

"For most of the year the HLP team operated without a sergeant and because of the injuries as described earlier, at times the team consisted of a handful of officers, not the nine officers normally assigned," he said. "In addition, and for most of the year, the HLP team worked with only one DMH clinician instead of two. The county reshuffled their staff, cutting our staffing by one position and that position has not been replaced."

DOWNTOWN

STAFF: SMPD has struggled to consistently find enough employees despite peaks and valleys

Crime in the downtown area increased throughout 2022 to a peak in August/ September. Bautista highlighted specific efforts targeted at the downtown area and the success of increased holiday patrols from late November to late December.

"We noted during our holiday deployment that we had approximately 95 fewer reported events while we were deployed in comparison to the previous five weeks," he said.

TECHNOLOGY AND PLANNING AHEAD

Despite being known as Silicon Beach with its cluster of technology companies, Santa Monica has not kept pace with modern technology in the police department.

The Doctors Are In.


Pediatrician and Santa Monica native, Dr. Noel Salyer, says parents sometimes feel helpless when it comes to kids' nutrition when all they want to eat is 'kid food'. She doesn't label foods as good or bad, but talks to kids about foods that make them "strong and healthy", calling them "growing foods". "You can control the home environment. You can't necessarily control every other interaction that your kid has," she says.

Salyer and her colleague, Dr. Karina Eastman, focus on getting to the root of the problem, rather than just treating the symptoms at Pacific Ocean Pediatrics in Santa Monica. When asked about the top two things to avoid in our children's diet, both physicians agree that added sugar and food dyes top the list. "It's not just the sweets and the candy and the things that we know have sugar," Dr. Eastman points out. "It's hiding in our crackers, in our popcorn, in our dressings, in our pasta sauce, in our vitamins, it's in everything."

When Dr. Eastman points out that the recommended amount of added sugar for children aged 2-18 is less than 25 grams, I'm shocked and not because of how easy it is to consume six teaspoons of sugar. The recommendation is the SAME for teens nearing adulthood as it is for toddlers? Dr. Eastman emphasizes that it's not just the immediate effects like bouncing off the walls. "Excess consumption of sugar early in life is linked to the onset of type-2 diabetes, heart disease, high blood pressure, obesity later in life....and [is linked to] decreasing our immune system."

SMALL STEPS.

When boosting immunity, both doctors underscore the importance of a good diet and recommend omitting processed foods. Since nutrients are more effectively absorbed in whole foods rather than in pill form, eating well is essential. They agree that sleep is pivotal when it comes to our immune systems. Both sleep and exercise boost our immune cells called T cells. "[Exercise] improves response to vaccines and improves resistance to viral and bacterial infections," continues Dr. Eastman. "Meditation decreases inflammatory markers, increases T cells, increases antibody levels and deep sleep." I picture getting my 2-year-old to



sit still for 30 seconds and stifle a giggle.

Eating the rainbow should only pertain to colorful fruits and veggies. Though many food colorings have been banned in Europe, dyes like Red No., 40 and Yellow No. 5 and 6 are still available in the U.S. Used prodigiously in 'kid food', these dyes have been linked to hyperactivity, including ADHD, irritability, behavioral changes and even depression. While some children have developed allergies to them, several hues have even been linked to tumors in lab rats.

Dr. Salyer practices what she preaches with her three kids. "We schedule breakfasts. My kids were wanting to have cereal every morning. I fall into these traps too ... so now we have a schedule of breakfasts, so we're getting variety. I think there's a balance, I really do."

"It's really easy to get lost in all of this and get overwhelmed by trying to do the right thing and trying to feed your kid as best you can," Eastman's voice is soothing. "All the information out there about chemicals and organic, we all just do the best we can with the information we have. Small steps get us to where we want to be. Everything in balance."

Life is, after all, a balancing act.

Allen Introduces Legislation to on Safety and Training for Drivers

In an effort to improve the safety of young drivers and those on the road around them, Senator Ben Allen (D-Santa Monica) introduced SB 473, which will expand California's Graduated Driver License (GDL) program to include new drivers under 21 years of age. Currently, the program only covers 16- and 17-year-old drivers in their first year of driving.

"As a father, I am heartbroken by the stories of parents who lost their children due to an accident caused by an untrained driver," said Senator Allen, who serves on the Senate Transportation Committee. "With this practical expansion of the Graduated Driver License program, research shows we can annually save the lives of 500 young people just beginning to make their mark on the world."

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reports motor vehicle collisions and other accidents as a leading cause of death for teenagers and young adults. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), young drivers (ages 15 to 20) accounted for nearly nine percent of drivers involved in fatal crashes in 2020 despite making up only five percent of all drivers on the road. In the same year, there was a 17 percent increase in the number of young driver fatalities.

"My daughter, Nora Rose-Hines, lost her life when her car was hit at a dangerous intersection by a 19-year-old driver with little driving experience and no driver education," said Pat Hines, founder and director of Safe Moves Los Angeles. "I know that losing a child is the greatest fear of every parent, but it is unimaginable until it happens to you. Had the driver who crashed into Nora had more experience my daughter would be alive today. Senator Allen's bill will help ensure other families do not suffer like we have."

Implemented in 1998 in an effort to properly educate young drivers about the hazards of operating motor vehicles, California's GDL program requires teens under 18 to gradually earn full driving privileges. These drivers must attend driver education courses, spend six hours behind the wheel with a driving school instructor, and devote 50 hours to on-the-road practice under the supervision of a licensed adult over the age of 25. After successfully completing the necessary education and DMV driving tests, the young drivers receive provisional licenses with additional restrictions on nighttime driving and driving with other teens.

SB 473 will require all new drivers under age 21 to undergo driver training and provisional licensing periods. A 2013 study funded by NHTSA found that GDL programs have reduced the overall number of crashes among teen drivers up to 30 percent nationwide. The same study showed inexperienced 18- to 20-year-old drivers are involved in fatal crashes at rates up to 60 percent higher than other age groups.

"Traffic crashes are the leading cause of fatalities for far too many of California's teenagers and youth," said Lieutenant Rudy Perez, a 22-year veteran of the Los Angeles School Police Department. "Providing all first-time, young drivers with driver education and training before sending them out onto our congested roadways is crucial."



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


