



## Federal labor regulators demand Starbucks reopen shuttered Pier location

The Starbucks corporation may be forced to reopen a location at the Santa Monica Pier that closed in 2022 following a ruling by federal regulators this week accusing the company of trying to undermine unionization efforts across the country. Regional Director Ronald K. Hooks in the National Labor Relation Board's Region 19 (Seattle) Office issued a complaint on December 13 against Starbucks Corporation consolidating several cases along the West Coast. The complaint alleged that Starbucks closed 23 stores (including the Ocean Front Walk & Moss store in Santa Monica and five other stores in LA), eight of which had

Workers United certified as bargaining representative, to discourage membership in a labor organization. The complaint further alleges that Starbucks closed the stores without prior notice to the union and without affording the union an opportunity to bargain about the decisions and that a manager told employees they could not "borrow" shifts at other stores while the employer negotiated with the union about the closures.

The NLRB General Counsel is seeking an order for several remedies, including immediate reopening of all 23 stores and offers of reemployment for unit employees; bargaining in good faith with the eight unionized stores; make-whole relief for

### Santa Monica Rugby Club hosts Oxford University RFC

The Santa Monica Rugby Club hosted the Oxford University first XV on Tuesday night in an enjoyable, albeit somewhat one-sided game played at the grounds of Santa Monica High School, with the game ultimately ending 7-47 to the visitors.

The Santa Monica Dolphins drew first blood with a try from number 14, Right Winger Zak Wall in the 14th minute, which was successfully converted by number 15, Full Back Jaime Chuidian. However, the Oxford Blues replied just five minutes later with a try from number 13, Outside Center Wolfe Morn, which was then converted by number 11, Left Winger Vasco Faria.

Oxford were coming to the end of their four-game Southern California tour, having played games over the weekend against the San Diego Legion on Saturday and the Chicago Hounds also in San Diego on Sunday. The tour began last Thursday with a thrilling match against the UCLA Bruins, in an incredibly close contest that saw the score level for most of the game. However, the Bruins inched ahead in the closing stages of the match to finish the game 20-12.

The Blues also lost against both the Legion and the Hounds, so they were looking to end the tour with a win. While Oxford might still have been struggling with jet lag, the Dolphins were fielding a team with many new players that were hungry for on-field experience, especially against an international side.

"I don't even know half the guys on our team tonight and that means all these young, new guys that are new to the team, new to playing at a higher level and therefore can get a game. And you know, if Oxford gets a win, that's good for them of course, but this is worth so much more to our depth and breadth as a team going forward," Steven Johnson, President of Santa Monica Rugby Club, said.

Despite the Dolphins retaining possession for much of the first 40 minutes, they couldn't quite manage to turn that advantage into points and their score remained at one converted try. But the home side remained resilient and did not give up a single inch without a fight, right up to the final whistle. Santa Monica's scrum was solid throughout the whole 80-minute match, which was an achievement since the Blues dominated that set piece in their match against the Bruins.

Both teams maintained their discipline, mostly, and while there were a number of unforced handling errors from each side, there were also some thoroughly enjoyable moments of individual effort and throughout the game, the tacking was fierce. Interestingly, the game is refereed slightly differently in the US than it is in the UK, with less strict rules on the height of tackles on this side of the Pond and that was something that certainly took Oxford by surprise in their first game against UCLA as the Blues were hit hard — and high — on more than one occasion.

"This was a good game and a great tour for Oxford and I can see the transition in their style of play, from the UCLA game to this one," said Marquise Goodwin, the Major League Rugby referee who oversaw

City of Malibu Launches New Webpage as Part of Efforts to Improve Safety on Pacific Coast Highway

The City of Malibu is thrilled to announce the launch of a dynamic webpage dedicated to keeping the community informed about ongoing efforts to improve safety conditions on Pacific Coast Highway (PCH) within Malibu city limits. The webpage, at www.MalibuCity.org/PCHSafety, is intended to serve as a central hub for updates, resources, and key information related to PCH safety projects, and milestones. This initiative represents a significant step forward in the City's commitment to transparency, education, and community engagement on all things PCH.

"Our goal is to create an environment where safety is a shared responsibility. This webpage serves as a vital tool for keeping our community and stakeholders informed about the ongoing efforts to enhance public safety on PCH in Malibu," said City Manager Steve McClary. "We believe that an informed community is a safer community."

The newly unveiled webpage is designed to be a one-stop destination for residents, businesses, and visitors seeking the latest information on PCH Safety efforts. Key features include, but are not limited to, the following:

City Updates: Stay informed about any recent actions taken by the City of Malibu to address safety concerns on PCH.

Events and Meetings: Find information on recent or upcoming events, meetings and opportunities for community involvement and collaboration relevant to PCH safety.

PCH Safety Taskforce Updates: Stay engaged with summaries and outcomes from PCH Taskforce meetings as we actively work to address challenges and implement solutions to improve safety along this vital corridor.

Enforcement Initiatives: Learn about our efforts led by LA County Sherriff's Department and California Highway Patrol to improve traffic management, promote safe driving practices and address specific safety concerns.

Resources: Find valuable resources, including PCH traffic and law enforcement reports and statistics to better understand the current state of PCH safety.

Fact Sheet: A list of actions the City has taken to improve PCH safety.

Improving safety on PCH has long been a priority for the community. PCH is a state highway under the jurisdiction of Caltrans, leaving the City with limited ability to make changes to the highway. Nonetheless, the City has taken numerous actions and has invested millions of dollars in recent years to improve PCH safety within its ability.

In recent years, conditions on PCH have grown increasingly hazardous with excessive speeding, reckless and distracted driving, and intoxicated driving. Since 2010, 58 individuals have died on Pacific Coast Highway in Malibu. During the past 10 years, Malibu has had more than 4,000 traffic collisions, 1,600 of which involved injuries, and more than 100,000 traffic citations have been issued. On October 17, 2023, four Pepperdine students tragically lost their lives after being struck by a speeding motorist while walking on PCH.

To address the crisis, the City Council declared a Local Emergency on November 13, 2023. This proactive measure underscores the urgency and significance of addressing this threat to public safety in our community.

Community members are encouraged to visit www.MalibuCity.org/PCHSafety regularly to stay informed and engaged in the collective effort to improve safety on Pacific Coast Highway. Any significant updates on the PCH safety effort will be posted on the webpage, as well as on the City's social media accounts.

City of Santa Monica Ordinance Number 2769 (CCS) (City Council Series

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SANTA MONICA AMENDING SANTA MONICA MUNICIPAL CODE SECTION 4.04.390 PERTAINING TO THE FEEDING OF BIRDS AND OTHER ANIMALS IN THE CITY PUBLIC RIGHT-OF-WAY

The following is a summary of Ordinance Number 2769 (CCS) prepared by the Office of the City Attorney:

Santa Monica Municipal Code (SMMC) Section 4.04.390 establishes prohibitions against feeding animals and birds in certain locations. The Ordinance amends SMMC Section 4.04.390 to expand prohibited feeding locations to the Santa Monica Municipal and Newcomb Piers and to the public beach. It also clarifies the location of "off leash areas" to include locations within public parks.

The Ordinance will take effect thirty days after its adoption.

### **City Clerk Denise Anderson-**Warren honored

In Tuesday's relatively light City Council meeting, not only was Phil Brock officially recognized as Mayor as he and former Mayor Gleam Davis went through the formality of swapping seats, but long-serving City Clerk, Denise Anderson-Warren, was honored in her last Council meeting before retiring from public service.

Anderson-Warren's first appearance in chambers was a special meeting on Friday, November 21, 2003, almost 20 years ago to the day. Back then, Richard Bloom was Mayor of Santa Monica and George W. Bush was President. The Iraq War was in progress, Arnold Schwarzenegger was sworn in as governor of California and England became Rugby World Cup champions after defeating Australia 20-17 in extra time.

However, by this time, she'd already been an employee of the City of Santa Monica for over five years, serving as Deputy City Clerk before obtaining her certification as a Certified Municipal Clerk in 2003 from the International Institute of Municipal Clerks.

A video showing archived footage of that meeting was shown as part of a tribute to Anderson-Warren, who was Deputy City Clerk then. In May of 2016, a special proclamation on behalf of the City Council was made, declaring May 1 through 7, Municipal Clerks Week and she collected a certificate from then-Mayor Ted Winterer.

Interestingly, Gleam Davis joined the City Council in February 2009 and upon being elected to the position of Mayor Pro Tempore in December 2016, Anderson-Warren presided over the swearing in ceremony, her first at that point. The video montage included a nice collection of entertaining Council clips, including one showing the clock of one meeting at 4 a.m.

Councilmember Caroline Torosis presented Anderson-Warren with a certificate of recognition of service saying, "We recognize her for her dedication and service to the voters of Santa Monica, but I also want to acknowledge that she and her office were city clerks during a period of really great change for the way that we do elections in LA County ... And that she was also the clerk

I have to give my shout out to Maria Stewart. She was my clerk for 18 years and she taught me how to be patient, how to be fair, how to not take things personally. And when you sit here remember, you're working in partnership with the Mayor or the Mayor Pro Tem to run this meeting to be efficient and effective - Anderson-Warren

during a global pandemic.

"I also just want to say that Denise and her office are the conduit between the public and the elected and although they're behind the scenes, none of this would happen if it weren't for Denise and her team," Torosis added.

Following in a recently established tradition, Davis presented Anderson-Warren with a mocked up street sign in the style of the City of Santa Monica that had "Anderson-Warren Way" printed on it. She credited her husband Larry and her son Darius and her daughter Aneissa and spoke of how Santa Monica could pride itself on being a city that allows and encourages free and fair elections. "I have to give my shout out to Maria

### **Progressives frustrated by** failure to enact their agenda in deep blue California

Seemingly, California is a deeply blue state in which Democrats hold virtually all of the levers of political power, including all statewide offices and three-fourths of the Legislature's seats.

However, California's most frustrated political bloc these days are the progressives who yearn to remake the state into a model of economic and social egalitarianism with an extensive array of free or low-cost services ranging from universal health care and family income supports to child care and higher education.

Their movement seemed to be making some gains last year when Gov. Gavin Newsom, outwardly the most progressive governor in history, was bragging about a \$97 billion state budget surplus and approving expansions of child care, health coverage for undocumented immigrants and other points of the progressive agenda.

It was a fleeting moment at best.

The massive surplus has since become a massive deficit – \$68 billion according to the Legislature's budget analyst – while Newsom has been drifting toward the political middle as he concentrates on building a national profile. He talks a lot more about fighting street crime these days than his 2018 campaign pledge to bring single-payer health care to the state.

Progressive groups are now lamenting that they have been unable to realize their many goals and sounding the alarm about losing ground despite having, on paper, a state government full of vocal allies.

"Why are we coming up short?" Dr. Manual Pastor of USC's Equity Research Institute said during a roundtable discussion Tuesday aimed at forging a new coalition of progressive organizations to push for change.

"This is the work of our generation,"

Henry A.J. Ramos, a senior fellow for the Institute on Race, Power and Political Economy, said.

"While solidly Democratic, California still hasn't lived up to its progressive reputation in terms of real policy change," Ramos and another seminar participant, attorney and organizer Robb Smith, wrote in Capitol Weekly a few months ago. "Why not, when we have such a large pool of left-leaning voters? Because securing long-overdue social and economic justice reforms across our state will require a much greater focus on coalescing voters to first approve structural changes in state governance."

The term "structural changes" means contesting state laws, some of them in the constitution, that make it difficult to raise taxes that would be needed to finance the movement's agenda, even if the state didn't have a big budget gap.

The same lament is also found in another appeal this week from the California Earned Income Tax Credit Coalition, which supported the state's initial efforts to raise incomes of poor families by giving them refundable state tax credits.

The coalition, citing rising levels of poverty, called on legislators to protect the tax credit and other programs to support poor families as they deal with the state's huge budget deficit – by raising taxes if necessary. The coalition specifically supports Senate Bill 220, which would increase corporate income taxes.

Legislative leaders have issued pro forma assurances that they will protect vital programs as they deal not only with the \$68 billion current deficit but projections of multibillion-dollar shortfalls for years to come. However, something will have to give – unless they muster the will to raise taxes on corporations and the wealthy that progressives seek.

Newsom has adopted a no-new-taxes

mantra as he moderates his national image, but he also opposes a businessbacked ballot measure, scheduled for the November 2024 ballot, that would make it even more difficult to increase local

and state taxes. Its passage would be the ultimate setback for progressives who already feel stymied.

affected employees, including for loss of pay and other benefits, search-for-work and interim employment expenses, and other direct or foreseeable financial harms; electronic distribution of a notice to all employees nationwide; a notice reading by a senior management official and electronic distribution of a video recording of that reading; and training for managers and supervisors.

Starbucks closed the Ocean Front Walk store in 2022 after about two years of operation at that location citing an inability to provide a safe environment for staff and customers. It was one of 16 stores throughout the country the company said it was closing for safety concerns as the company reimagined the future of the business. At the time, a Starbucks spokesperson said the closure was not the result of any one specific incident or even a set number of incidents over time but rather an accumulation of challenges related to substance abuse, homelessness and economic upheaval caused by the pandemic. In a statement, the company said the closing stores were no longer spaces where the company could provide employees, partners and customers with the experience they expect and are accustomed to.

The company has denied its actions were related to union efforts saying it routinely closed and opened stores as decided by market conditions.

Starbucks recently released a study conducted by independent labor expert Thomas Mackall that concluded the company did not engage in anti-union actions. Starbucks shareholders had demanded the study following two years of protracted labor complaints against the corporation. While Mackall concluded Starbucks should do more to improve communication with unions and revise its Global Human Rights Statement, he said there was no evidence the company interfered with unionization efforts.

Last week, the company said it's committed to bargaining with its unionized workers and reaching labor agreements next year, a major reversal for the coffee chain after two years fighting the unionization of its U.S. stores.

In a letter to Lynne Fox, the president of the Workers United union, Starbucks Chief Partner Officer Sara Kelly said the current bargaining impasse between the two sides "should not be acceptable to either of us." Kelly asked to restart bargaining in January.

"We will set as an ambition and hopeful goal the completion of bargaining and the ratification of contracts in 2024," Kelly wrote in the letter.

In a statement distributed by Workers United, Fox said she is reviewing the letter and will respond.

"We've never said no to meeting with Starbucks. Anything that moves bargaining forward in a positive way is most welcome," Fox said.

Workers United said the last bargaining session between the two sides was May 23.

Saturday marks the two-year anniversary of a Starbucks store in Buffalo, New York,

voting to unionize. It was the first companyowned store to join a union in more than three decades.

Since then, at least 370 company-owned U.S. Starbucks stores have voted to unionize, according to the National Labor Relations Board. There are about 9,600 company-owned Starbucks stores in the U.S.

Workers at 19 U.S. Starbucks stores have filed petitions with the NLRB to decertify the union as the bargaining representative at their stores, but none of those stores has voted on whether to remove the union. The NLRB can delay a decertification vote if an employer refuses to bargain.

Unionizing workers say they're seeking higher pay, more consistent schedules and more say in issues like store safety and workload during busy times. Seattle-based Starbucks has said its stores run more efficiently if it can work directly with its employees and not through a third party.

But the process has been contentious. Twice, federal courts have ordered Starbucks to reinstate workers who were fired after leading unionization efforts at their stores. Regional offices of the National Labor Relations Board have issued 120 complaints against Starbucks for unfair labor practices, including refusal to bargain and reserving pay raises and other benefits for non-union workers.

In October, Starbucks sued Workers United in federal court, demanding it stop using the name Starbucks Workers United for the group organizing its workers after that group posted a pro-Palestinian message on social media. Workers United countersued, saying Starbucks defamed the union by suggesting it supports violence. Starbucks said Friday that lawsuit is proceeding.

Starbucks said last week that its changing stance reflects its wish to support all of its employees. In her letter to Fox, Kelly pledged that the company would respect bargaining participants and refrain from disparaging conduct or language.

But Starbucks may also be shifting its position for business reasons. It reported record revenue in its fiscal fourth quarter, which ended in September, and its full-year revenue climbed nearly 12% to \$35.9 billion.

But the company's stock has fallen 10% since Nov. 16, when 5,000 workers at more than 200 unionized Starbucks stores went on strike. Placer.ai, an analytics company, said that after a strong fall, U.S. holiday visits to Starbucks appear to be down from a year ago.

The company may also be trying to head off an effort by the Strategic Organizing Center, a labor group, to elect three pro-union candidates to Starbucks' board of directors next year.

Now that the complaint has issued, the NLRB Regional Office will attempt to facilitate a settlement with the parties. If no settlement can be reached, the case is scheduled to go before an NLRB Administrative Law Judge (ALJ) on August 20, 2024. The ALJ would then issue a decision, which could be appealed to the Board.

### California gas tax revenue will drop by \$6 billion, threatening roads

California's funding from gas taxes will drop by nearly \$6 billion in the next decade due to the state's electric car rules and other climate programs, "likely resulting in a decline in highway conditions for drivers," according to a new state analysis released today.

As California phases in major policies aimed at reducing greenhouse gas emissions — such as the mandates for zero-emission cars and trucks — consumers buy less gasoline and diesel, and consequently pay less taxes.

Those declines in tax dollars will be partially offset by the state's road improvement fee, which drivers pay when they register their electric cars. But the Legislative Analyst's Office stressed that overall the state will still see a \$4.4 billion drop in funding, a 31% decline, over a decade, so the Legislature and governor must come up with substantial new funding sources.

Unless the drop is accounted for with new fees or other funding, there would be substantially less money for highway programs as well as local road maintenance, the analysts wrote. Work supporting buses, trains and other public transit options across the state also would face drops in funding.

"As the state tries to meet its ambitious climate goals through the adoption of zero emission vehicles, and greater fuel efficiency within conventional vehicles, the report finds that we'll see a decline in fuel tax revenues," said Frank Jimenez, a senior fiscal and policy analyst with the office.

Fuel taxes and vehicle fees fund about a third of state spending on transportation. This year's budget, passed in June, includes about \$14.2 billion in state funding for transportation.

The report projects declines of \$5 billion, or 64%, in the state's gasoline excise tax, \$290 million, or 20%, in the diesel excise tax and \$420 million, or 20%, in the diesel sales tax, over the next decade.

Highway maintenance is funded primarily by the fuel taxes "and therefore will face significant funding declines," the report says. "...We project funding for these programs will drop by roughly \$1.5 billion (26 percent) over the next decade, from \$5.7 billion to \$4.2 billion."

The state's transportation agency, Caltrans, declined to comment. "Caltrans is reviewing the report but does not comment on potential legislative proposals," a spokesperson said.

Lawmakers could make up for the shortfalls in many of these programs by spending less on transportation, but that would likely mean worsening roads and highways, and also some public mass transit cuts. They might also consider further increasing gas taxes or vehicle fees. But that might have an outsized impact on the state's lower-income communities, who are expected to adopt zero-emission vehicles more slowly as middle- or higherincome Californians.

Lawmakers also could consider using other state funds for transportation or implementing a road charge, which would tax people based on the number of miles they drive.

The report comes as California is bracing for a projected \$68 billion budget deficit next year. Gov. Gavin Newsom's Finance Department on Tuesday ordered departments and agencies across government to reign in spending on everything from travel to office supplies.

California aims to reduce its greenhouse gas emissions by 85% below 1990 levels by 2045, when the state is expected to reach a statewide goal of net zero emissions. One of the most prominent ways the state is doing that is by banning the sale of all new gaspowered cars by 2035.

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

### **Reader Questions – Who Insures What in the Planned Development?**

#### **KELLY G. RICHARDSON, ESQ. CCAL**

Kelly: Can a Planned Unit Development purchase "Bare Walls" fire insurance for residences since the HOA does not own them? R.M., Vista

Dear R.M.: The term "Planned Development" is used in California and is found in Civil Code Section 4175. Although the term "planned unit development" is often used, it isn't found in California law. Planned developments normally involve the homeowners owning a separate piece of property called a "lot," which is normally created under the Subdivision Map Act. The lot may have attached or detached housing. It's important to note that attached townhouse-style planned development residences are often mistaken for condominiums - read your CC&Rs to be sure.

The HOA's obligation to obtain property damage insurance normally arises through the CC&Rs. Sometimes in attached planned developments, the CC&Rs require the HOA to insure all the "improvements" on the property, even though the structures are individually owned. Some such HOAs conduct membership votes to amend their CC&Rs to reduce the coverage to just "bare walls" or even eliminate the insurance completely, which places the responsibility completely upon the individual homeowners. This is a serious decision in which the HOA's legal counsel should be involved before submitting it to the homeowner membership. If the CC&Rs do not require the HOA to insure the individually owned homes, it would be a very good idea to give homeowners substantial advance notice before this is changed. Thanks, Kelly.

Mr. Richardson: You have NO idea how much your weekly articles have assisted the betterment of our association. Is the manager or our board responsible for ensuring that ALL residents have a personal insurance policy in effect within our condo complex? Insurance premiums have gone through the roof, and we've

had a recent severe increase of our HOA monthly dues, as a result of 2 fires within condos. Apparently, the two owners of those 2 condos had NO insurance to cover all the damage, thus all other association members paid the wrath, with increased monthly dues increases. Are not ALL residents in an HOA required to have insurance coverage for damage related to the adjoining attached units, if it was fires caused by the resident and at no fault coverage under the HOA's guidelines and responsibilities ?

Respectfully, J.H., Fullerton

Dear J.H.: Thanks for your kind words. It is gratifying to know I can make a difference for HOAs. As to individual condominium insurance, mortgage lenders normally require homeowners to have such insurance in place. Many HOA CC&Rs or rules also require individual unit owners to carry insurance. This requirement is cumbersome to enforce since it would require the manager to track the expiration dates of all the various individual policies and to have copies of all the insurance information on file.

An individual insurance policy should protect not just against damage but also liability- if something within the unit results in damage to another unit such as a fire or leak from within the unit.

When drafting CC&R revisions requiring individual unit insurance, I make sure the HOA is not required to insure those interiors and I add a "consumer advisory" alerting members that their failure to keep that insurance could result in a great financial hardship to them in the event of a loss.

Soundwaves Concert Series Announces 2024 Season

The Santa Monica Public Library's acclaimed Soundwaves new music series will present seven concerts in 2024, each on the first Saturday of the month at 3:30PM, all in the Main Library's Martin Luther King Jr. Auditorium at 601 Santa Monica Blvd.

The year begins with two shows of contemporary compositions for strings. On January 6, the Isaura String Quartet gives a program featuring the world premiere of a piece written for them by Sarah Hennies, and violinist/violist/vocalist Wendy Richman, best known as a member of the International Contemporary Ensemble, performs February 3, joined for part of her set by percussionist Tim Feeney.

On March 2 Chris Jonas, a saxophonist who has worked with Cecil Taylor and Anthony Braxton, presents Music from the Deserts, a video and set of compositions inspired by his home in Santa Fe. His band features Cory Wright (reeds), Lisa Mezzacappa (bass), and Jason Levis (drums), all from Oakland.

April 6 spotlights pieces from recent releases on the Venice-based postminimalist Cold Blue Music record label including John Luther Adams' "Darkness and Scattered Light" for five basses.

On May 4, guitarist Joe Baiza, founder of SST Records bands Saccharine Trust and Universal Congress Of, brings a quartet with Jessika Kenney (vocals), David O. Jones (bass guitar), and Brian Christopherson (drums).

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

appears likely to secure victories for her allies in cases on abortion, affirmative action, and gun rights. And yet good old Clarence never recuses himself. No wonder the popularity of the Supreme Court is at its lowest in history.

Back to Georgie Porgie. Apparently in the less than one year Santos was in office he fibbed a little, or maybe told some whoppers, or more likely, is just a pathological liar. The dog died and Osthoff rhetorically asks of Santos, "Do you have a soul?" (Obviously not but he has pretty smooth skin thanks to the Botox.)

It's estimated that Santos could face up to 20 years of incarceration so he's open to a plea but no jail, saying, "Prison is not pretty." Otherwise he's continuing to live a lavish night life. He's signed with Cameo app videos and brags, "I'm making more with them than I did as a member of Congress." If we're to believe him, a big if, he's receiving \$599 for every Cameo he sends out, whereas it's joked that Rudy Giuliani's fee is down to \$50 and a bottle of scotch.

Eventually Santos will likely wind up in court. As adept as he is in fabrication, I can imagine him pleading, "Guilty your honor, but with an explanation."

Every member of Council took a turn in thanking Anderson-Warren for her tireless service and patience.



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
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
