

New atmospheric eatery to offer a Parisian twist to the humble hamburger

Celebrated Canadian chef Sean MacDonald is about to unveil his second restaurant in Santa Monica, right next door to the very first one he opened, in April of last year. Called Burgette, it's a Parisianinspired eatery that will offer burgers and small dishes, each with a very subtle French twist.

Set to open sometime in February, it's located at 111 Santa Monica Blvd, immediately adjacent to Bar Monette, his Spanish and Italian themed restaurant. MacDonald says it was too good of an opportunity to pass up on.

Nestled in-between Tumbi Craft and the BOA Steakhouse in the bustling epicenter of the city's Downtown district, both Bar Monette and Burgette are in the heart of Santa Monica's tourist quarter, just a stone's throw from the Third Street Promenade and the Pier.

"The opportunity presented itself and I thought, 'I can take it or somebody else could put something there," he says. "So I thought I'll push myself and do something with the space. Restaurant concept design is a big thing for me, so I was super keen and excited to just jump at the opportunity."

Like so many instances where restaurant properties change hands, if the industrial-scale catering facilities on site are geared toward a certain type of cuisine, like a professional pizza oven for instance, then it can very often influence the direction for whoever takes over the space. Even with minimal upgrades and replacements, utilizing existing appliances can save a lot of money. And prior to MacDonald taking the lease, the site was the home of Stout


"So, the theme before was like burgers and beer. When I walked around the space, it was a little

Harbaugh returning to NFL to coach **Chargers after leading Michigan to** national title, AP sources say

Jim Harbaugh will be the head coach of the Los Angeles Chargers, leaving Michigan after capping his ninth season as coach of college football's winningest program with the school's first national championship since 1997, two people familiar with the situation told The Associated Press.

The people spoke to the AP on condition of anonymity because the team hasn't made the announcement.

Harbaugh made the highly anticipated decision Wednesday to go back to the NFL after a second interview and resume his chase for a Super Bowl that eluded him as a quarterback and coach.

He will be the first former Chargers player to return to the team as head coach. He played for the Bolts in 1999-2000 before retiring following the 2001 season.

Los Angeles was looking for a new coach and general manager after Brandon Staley and Tom Telesco were fired on Dec. 15, a day after a 63-21 loss in Las Vegas to the Raiders.

Harbaugh first met with the Chargers on Jan. 15. He was the eighth of 15 coaching candidates to interview with the Spanos family. He was the only one to get a second interview.

The Atlanta Falcons also talked to Harbaugh on Jan. 16 and had booked a second interview before he decided to accept the Chargers job.

Harbaugh was 86-25 at Michigan and restored college football's winningest program to relevance after it slipped over several seasons under Brady Hoke and Rich Rodriguez following the retirement of national-championship winning coach Lloyd Carr. The rival Ohio State Buckeyes had an eight-

game winning streak against the Wolverines until Harbaugh helped them snap the streak in 2021, leading to their first of three straight Big Ten titles and College Football Playoff appearances.

Following two straight losses in the semifinals, extending Harbaugh's winless streak in bowl games to six, Michigan outlasted Alabama at the Rose Bowl and pulled away from Washington to win the national championship with a school-record 15-0 mark.

Michigan tried to keep Harbaugh, offering him a new six-year contract for \$11.5 million per season, according to a person familiar with the negotiations told The Associated Press. The person spoke on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to share details of the deal.

Harbaugh's alma mater could not offer the one thing he desperately wants - a Super Bowl title.

The Chargers have one of the league's top quarterbacks in Justin Herbert, but finished 5-12 this season and lost eight of their last nine, including the last five. Herbert will be playing for his fourth head coach and possibly fourth offensive coordinator in five seasons.

This is the first time since 2007, when Norv Turner succeeded Marty Schottenheimer, that the Chargers have opted to go with someone with previous head coaching experience. Turner directed the team to three straight postseason appearances, including the AFC championship game during the 2007 season. The Chargers have not won a division title since 2009, which was also under Turner.

Violent crime in Los Angeles decreased in 2023. But officials worry the city is perceived as unsafe

Violent crime overall in Los Angeles decreased more than 3% in 2023, officials said Wednesday, despite a perception that the nation's second-largest city is unsafe.

Blaring headlines and shocking video footage of smash-and-grab robberies, where dozens of individuals come into a luxury store and begin stealing en masse, has prompted some Californians to fear shopping -

despite a 33% downturn in such crimes in LA since the formation of a regional task force in August.

"Our commitment is to address that perception," LAPD Chief Michel Moore said during a news conference alongside Mayor Karen Bass.

Wednesday's news conference comes as the civilian board of police commissioners vets interim chief candidates to replace Moore, who unexpectedly announced his retirement earlier this month. He will step down at the end of February but remain on as a consultant for an unspecified period.

There was a nearly 17% dip in homicides in

2023, from 392 victims in 2022 to 327 last year, according to data released by the department.

But that milestone meant more people were killed in traffic crashes - 336 - than in homicides in 2023, for the first time in nine years. The department has prioritized traffic safety goals going forward, Moore said.

Data about use-of-force incidents, including police shootings, is scheduled for release by March 1.

The Band Flies On, But Sadly

THE BAND

I grew up across the street from Mike McPherson, six months older, a most precocious guy in so many ways. Mike was really smart and got pushed ahead a year in the middle of sixth grade, along with two classmates, elementary school babies thrown abruptly into the shark-filled waters of middle school. Unheard of, then, in my public school. Sure made the rest of us feel inadequate. (It helped when I won the Spelling Bee.) Who knew they were so bored with the history and math the rest of us were struggling with?

One of the other two was Mary Anne Frye, a tall redhead he later married. I know, how smart were their kids going to be? But they decided the world already had too many humans, another radical attitude. The first time I heard of Reed College was when Mike was accepted there. He chose it over a couple of Ivy League schools that wanted him.

He spent time in New York, maybe in the summers, reveling in the Beat crowd milieu there. At Reed too but, he regaled me with tales of protests and poetry in the parks of New York, and of seeing The Fugs perform on a street corner. Blew my mind. Such a life there was beyond Albuquerque.

I think Mike took after his mom Helen, housewife, cookie baker supreme, and artist of note who exhibited in galleries and won blue ribbons with ease at the state fair, in a state crawling with great artists. I own a couple of her churches, and a pastel portrait of my mom. They were good buddies, like Mike and me. When Helen decided she could lay down a big backyard patio of red bricks, as a novice, my mom figured she could too. My mom was meticulous with measurements and levels, fine sand, and tapping bricks into perfect order with the back end of a short garden tool. It took many months. I'm betting both those brick patios are still in great shape nearly 70 years later.

I wasn't experienced enough to understand how out there Helen was from the usual neighborhood mom. I wish I could remember more of the stories she wove to a captive cookie-eating audience, but I'm sure she left out a lot of the best details.

Two moments about her and Mike and music, stand out. One sunny day in the early '60s I walked across the street and knocked on the McPherson's door, asking Helen if Mike was home. She screwed up her face terribly and told me, "Come on in, he's in his room listening to the WORST singer I have ever heard!" Mike, of course, had an early Bob Dylan album.

A few years later I returned home after two years of Army service, fall of '68, and another walk across the street to Mike's yielded a treasure. "Here," he announced, placing an album in my hands, almost ceremoniously. It had colorful paintings of musicians on the cover, childlike

renderings. "I won't say anything about it" – he always had a lot to say about music he loved "—just listen and tell me what you think." It was The Band's first album, "Music from Big Pink'" and he was wise not to give me any clues, because I had never heard anything like it in my life. It was magical, every cut. What are these guys playing? How do they create such feeling and images, so effortlessly? One of the singers sounds very country, but it's not that, it's not rock, too strange for the pop charts or AM car radio.

They're all gone now. Mike, Mary Anne, Helen (lived to nearly 100), and all The Band but one. Garth Hudsdon, the mysterious keyboard guru who worked his magic almost out of sight in the back. He was several years older than the rest of The Band, and his unfashionably long beard, gone prematurely gray, made him seem like an out of place grandpa. But he was the soul of The Band, and now he's 86. Thanks, Mike.

R.I.P. PAUL LACQUES

We lost a good one last week, far too early, at 69. Paul Lacques. Guitarabout-town (electric and acoustic, lap steel, mandolin, also drums, vocals, arranging, songwriting, producing), a vital member of so many seminal LA bands: Rotondi, Double Naught Spy Car, I See Hawks in LA, Underthings, Andy & the Rattlesnakes, Earthworm Ensemble). He was also a committed political activist, a successful playwright and satirical cartoonist, immediately recognizable for his magnificent long silver mane, recently cut back, but most importantly, a helluva nice guy, who would acknowledge you from wherever in his history you connected, smiling and chatting and looking you in the eye while doing his best to set up or break down. I first met him in the early '80s, at house parties thrown by my dear friend and LA Weekly colleague Susan Rosenberg. The last time I saw

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

something where we can get people in the door and create a good vibe," he says.

"With all of that kitchen infrastructure already in place, together with a customer base that enjoys burgers, it felt obvious. They [Stout Burgers] shut down without any fanfare and I've constantly seen customers trying the door to see if it's open, so I wanted to keep those customers while attracting new ones too."

This marks only the second venture for MacDonald in the US and outside of his home country of Canada. Originally hailing from Calgary, he was named Canada's best young chef in 2016 by San Pellegrino. He emphasizes that the French influence will be very subtle as many of the country's traditional flavors can be rather rich.

"I've never been the type to use a lot of butter or salt in food, I prefer to keep it refreshing and light, so it won't be rich at all ... There will be French cheeses and the wine list will almost all be French, with a couple

of German wines too. Oh, and Belgian beer. And it will be served in much smaller wine glasses, like the kind of thing you might find in a casual, dimly lit, Parisian side street cafe," says MacDonald.

He says that there will be about five different burgers - including an interesting sounding salmon belly smash-style burger and a lot of small plates, like salads and other French-inspired dishes, together with some large plates, such as steak and fried cod with ouzo. There will also be a few dessert choices that will probably rotate.

"I want to source everything locally," MacDonald says. "I'm going to use a friend's bakery nearby to make all the buns, because the kitchen isn't big enough here."

Burgette is currently on track for a late February opening and there will be around 45 to 50 covers, combining both the indoor space and the outside patio, plus a private room in the back that can be booked separately and also used as an overflow.

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
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
