Residents rally behind Bergamot Arts Center as Council pledges more support

ouncilmembers voted unanimously 7-0 to create an economic support program to ensure that the Bergamot Station Arts Center is thriving and continues to be a leading arts and cultural hub in Tuesday's meeting. However, the specifics of what exactly will be undertaken were not confirmed.

Almost every speaker under Item 6, that permits public input on remaining agenda items, was in attendance to talk about this issue, a clear indication of how strongly residents and local artists feel about this matter, many of whom have been living and working at the site for over two decades.

"I'm here along with other arts tenants at Bergamot to ask you to change the city's thinking about Bergamot. We urge you to consider it an art center first and a revenue generator second," said Charles Duncombe, Executive Director of City Garage Theatre.

'You have always supported the idea that it should be an arts center, one that is vibrant and inclusive. For that reason, we urge you to level the playing field, make it fair and accessible for all. The privilege of being at Bergamot should not be weighted toward those with the greatest ability to pay," he said.

Members of the arts community wrote a proposal to the Council submitted by Jeffrey Gordon, President of the Bergamot Tenants Association in which they ask for three initiatives. (Summarized.)

• The City assume the ownership expenses of management fees and security costs currently being passed as CAM (common area maintenance) charges and empower a representative to assist in leasing and tenancy issues.

• The City expedite approval for hardship tenants to give back a portion of their spaces, adding a lease clause granting this ongoing right to all tenants

• The City equalize rental rates to match the legacy rental rate of \$1.80 per square foot, reduce the rental rate for non-profit tenants to \$1 per square foot and reduce rent for exterior space to 30% of the new rate.

"Bergamot Station is not only a local treasure, not only a regional treasure, but it is an internationally recognized center for all aspects of the arts. From the most contemporary, from the most family friendly, from the most challenging, from the most innovative, from the most traditional, Bergamot Station constitutes a free museum," Michael Masucci of the Santa Monica Arts Commission said.

Tarrah von Lintel, gallery owner and board member of the Association of American Art Dealers said," In the last year we've already seen a number of galleries leave Bergamot Station because of lack of sales. The condition of the buildings and the availability of one year leases only will make it hard to find other galleries to fill vacancies.

Lois Lambert, owner of the Lois Lambert Gallery, said, "I've been at Bergamot for 30 years. I want to speak to you about the most

Barefoot beachgoers join first mile of ambitious hike

A group of roughly 30 beachgoers marched the Santa Monica Beach for the first mile of a 3,000-mile cross-country trek, walking in solidarity with Guinness World Record holder Anton Nootenboom.


the Santa Monica Beach on Feb. 17.

Otherwise known as "The Barefoot Dutchman," Nootenboom began the groundbreaking journey the morning of Feb. 17, setting out to travel from Los Angeles to New York City on his bare feet via sneaker brand Barebarics, which provides a nearbarefoot sneaker connecting feet to the ground while still providing protection. A Dutch Afghanistan veteran, Nootenboom has made worldwide news for his exploits, including being the first person to walk barefoot to the base camp of Mount Everest in 2019. The Guinness record came for Longest Barefoot Journey, walking 1,876 miles along the eastern coast of Australia in 2021.

Nootenboom intends on making the 3,000-mile walk, a considerable step up from his record, as part of the #BraveMenTalk campaign, which calls attention to male mental health globally. The walk will raise awareness and funds for several mental health charities, including Movember, the leading global charity for men's health, as well as We Are Mind, a Dutch non-profit providing mental health resources for those in the Netherlands. Nootenboom's own charity, Brave Men Talk Foundation, will also benefit from the trek.

"I'm excited, I'm nervous ... but above all, I have been super, super grateful to see all of you here. For me, it's mind-blowing. When I started (in) Australia, I was by myself ... going from there to standing here, seeing all of your faces ... it blows my mind," Nootenboom told the group of walkers on the beach adjacent to the Annenberg Community Beach House.

After the first mile down the beach, walking toward the Santa Monica Pier, Nootenboom will be taking approximately 7.5 million

barefoot steps over at least the next 240 days, crossing 13 states. He will traverse unique locations like Death Valley and the Rocky Mountains along the way.

He told his fellow walkers that his barefoot endeavors have proven to be beneficial to mental health, and that others can feel the same way if they choose the activity.

"These are your two pillars that you stand on, these are your two pillars for life," Nootenboom said. "The more you take care of the two pillars that you stand on, the better vou feel."

Gavin Newsom wants to resolve California's long debate over mental health

After California became a state in 1850. one of its first acts was to establish the Insane Asylum of California in Stockton, the first of 12 state hospitals meant to care for those with mental illness.

At their peak in 1959, the hospitals housed 37,489 people, but by then, mental hospitals had acquired a bad reputation as "snake pits," treating their patients as inmates and doing little to treat their illnesses. Reform efforts were already underway.

Eight years later, newly elected Gov. Ronald Reagan signed the Lanterman-Petris-Short Act, named for its three legislative authors, that aimed to reduce hospital populations and involuntary commitments and redirect those with mental illnesses into treatment in their own communities.

However, as journalist Dan Morain explained in a deeply researched article last year, the LPS was the product of political tradeoffs, lacked any financing for community-based treatment or housing, and eventually was disowned by its three legislative sponsors.

Nevertheless, the hospitals were depopulated and seven of them were closed. It left countless thousands of mentally ill Californians - and their families - in the lurch, trying to find care in a jumble of private and public clinics and seeking ways to pay for it.

For decades, politicians, mental health professionals and patient advocates have squabbled incessantly over the obvious crisis. Democrats blame Reagan for signing the LPS without funds for local services, but Republicans point out that Democrats controlled the budget process.

In 2004, 37 years after LPS was passed, voters passed Proposition 63, which placed an additional tax on incomes over \$1 million and dedicated proceeds to local mental health services. It was sponsored by Darrell Steinberg, then a state legislator from Sacramento with experience with mental health issues in his own family.

Over last two decades, Prop. 63 has pumped billions of dollars into those services. However, California still has an immense population of unhoused and untreated victims of mental illness, many among the state's nearly 200,000 homeless people.

While running for governor in 2018, Gavin Newsom pledged to make mental health reform a high priority, calling for a "command structure" that would standardize care throughout the state and hold caregivers accountable.

Newsom first won approval of "CARE Courts" that, at least partially, repealed the LPS ban on involuntary commitments. It would allow those with schizophrenia or other major mental conditions to be

involuntarily placed in treatment after triallike hearings.

Proposition 1, the only statewide measure on the March 5 ballot, is Newsom's second big move, but faces widespread - if politically weak opposition from counties which have been spending Prop. 63's revenues, up to \$3 billion a year, for the last two decades.


The measure, backed by millions of campaign dollars, would increase the state's share of Prop. 63 money from 5% to 10%, thus reducing counties' share, but also would require them to spend more on housing, education and support services for the mentally ill, reducing funds for treatment.

Opponents say the practical effect would be to deny care to patients that need it.

The other half of the measure, which is not as controversial, would authorize \$6.4 billion in bonds to build mental health treatment facilities and housing for homeless veterans and those with mental illnesses.

Although veterans' housing has nothing directly to do with mental health, it was obviously included to draw voter support and, in fact, television ads for the measure, featuring Newsom, mention nothing other than helping veterans.

Proposition 1 will very likely pass. It and the CARE court program will be the newest episodes in a decades-long debate. They will also be Newsom's legacy, for better or worse.

Biden heads to California to rev up his fundraising in anticipation of a costly rematch with Trump

President Joe Biden started a three-day swing through California on Tuesday as he looks to soak up more cash for his reelection bid.

Going into the trip, Biden's campaign and the Democratic National Committee announced Tuesday that they had collected \$42 million in contributions during January from 422,000 donors. Biden ended January with \$130 million in cash on hand. Campaign officials said that is the highest total amassed by any Democratic candidate at this point in the cycle.

Biden campaign manager Julie Chavez Rodriguez called the haul "an indisputable show of strength to start the election year."

While Team Biden-Harris continues to build on its fundraising machine, Republicans are divided – either spending money fighting Donald Trump, or spending money in support of Donald Trump's extreme and losing agenda - Julie Chavez Rodriguez

The figures suggest Biden is cementing an early cash advantage over Trump, his likely general election opponent. But the numbers still lag behind what Trump had amassed during a similar period in 2020, when his campaign routinely smashed fundraising records.

Raising money is only part of the equation. How well that cash is spent is also a major factor — as Trump well knows. His 2020 campaign effectively lit his massive cash surpluses on fire through a series of

questionable spending decisions.

This year, Trump retains his impressive abilityto hoover up campaign cash, particularly from grassroots donors who typically chip in small amounts online. Trump, who hasn't released his January fundraising numbers yet, also faces a new threat to his campaign's finances: the staggering legal bills he racked up while defending himself in four separate criminal cases.

In order to maintain an edge in what's widely expected to be an expensive rematch with Trump, Biden's campaign will need to accelerate his fundraising. This week's trip to Los Angeles and the

This week's trip to Los Angeles and the San Francisco Bay area will mark Biden's third visit to California in just over two months for political events. He's trying to make up for lost time after largely avoiding the Democratic donor stronghold during last year's strikes by the Writers Guild of America and SAG-AFTRA.

Biden heads first to Los Angeles, where he will take part in a fundraiser. He'll also make campaign stops in San Francisco and Los Altos Hills this week and deliver a policy speech near Los Angeles on Wednesday.

Biden made a quick visit to Los Angeles earlier this month for a meeting with supporters in the city's upscale Bel Air neighborhood. He and first lady Jill Biden also spent a weekend in December in the Los Angeles area for campaign events.

The first lady is traveling Tuesday to Guilford, Connecticut, to hold a campaign fundraiser on behalf of her husband.

While the Bidens will be pursuing deeppocketed donors this week, the campaign points to the number of smaller donations it has raised as an encouraging sign for the president.

The campaign says 97% of the 3 million donations it has received thus far were under \$200 each. Biden has also received pledges from 158,000 "sustaining donors" who have committed to donating monthly. That's more than double the amount Biden had at this point in the 2020 cycle, when his cash-strapped campaign limped out of Iowa following a fourth-place finish in the state's February caucuses.

The new totals include donations to Biden's political operation and to a network of joint fundraising arrangements with the national and state Democratic parties. Biden's 2020 campaign raised over \$1 billion, and could need even more in a likely Trump rematch.

"This haul will go directly to reaching the voters who will decide this election," said Biden campaign senior communications adviser TJ Ducklo.

Biden in recent days has seized on comments by Trump that call into question the U.S. commitment to defend NATO allies from attack as "dangerous" and "un-American." Trump earlier this month said he once warned that he would allow Russia to do whatever it wants to NATO member nations that are "delinquent" in devoting 2% of their gross domestic product to defense.

The Biden campaign launched digital ads last week in three battleground states —

Mariners CIF division championship runs come to close, hoops still in State hunt

Saturday's dreary skies were appropriate for the Saint Monica athletics program, as both the school's girls basketball and girls soccer squads were stopped in the semi-finals of their respective California Interscholastic Federation (CIF) Southern Section championship brackets.

In a morning contest, the previouslyundefeated Mariners girls soccer unit was bested by Maranatha, 3-2, ending a 20-game winning streak in the CIF-SS Division 7 semi-finals. The Minutemen from Pasadena matched a season-high of goals scored against the Mariners, matching totals from the Mariners' 4-3 win against Notre Dame Academy on Dec. 6, 2023, and a 4-3 victory against Cantwell-Sacred Heart of Mary on Jan. 13. The team's defense was outstanding throughout the campaign, as those three contests counted for 9 of the 14 total goals scored against the Mariners in 2023-24.

Despite the disappointing loss, the squad's 20-1 season was a boon for Saint Monica's.

"Everybody (was) really excited and encouraging, and we try to give all of our teams the same sort of attention and accolades, but when a team really (rose) like this, they clearly (had) a special year, I think people really (got) excited about it," Saint Monica Athletic Director Jason Bowers said of the squad during the playoff run. "I think it's been fun to see the community get excited for this group of girls."

Later in the day, the Mariners girls basketball team hosted St. Margaret's in the CIF-SS Division 3A semifinal, dropping the contest 49-41 despite a rousing fourth quarter comeback attempt. The squad kept the game close throughout the first half, trading three-point bombs with the Tartans from San Juan Capistrano, going into the break down 22-16.

In the second half, the Tartans outscored the Mariners 12-3 in the third quarter, followed by a 5-0 run to begin the final frame. Down 39-21, the team's offense began running through the quick decision-making of Kim Macias, and dwindled the deficit to just seven points in the final minutes. Down 46-39, Mecias was fouled on a three-point attempt with 59 seconds remaining, but the junior missed all three attempts.

Despite the late misses, Mecias was sparkling on offense, leading the Mariners with 16 points. Other offensive contributors for the squad were junior Melina Werhlie (9 points), senior Kaya Ghobrial (6 points), senior Shadel French (6 points) and sophomore Sydney Ghobrial (4 points).

While the soccer season is over, the Mariners basketball season stays alive, as all CIF-SS semi-finalists qualify for the CIF State Championship bracket, which will begin on either Feb. 27 or Feb. 28.

troubling part of what has happened to me at Bergamot, which is the increase of CAM charges. We have no heater, or air conditioning, no water and in most of the buildings, only one public bathroom with a code to get in. Which, when we have events of hundreds of people, is unsatisfactory.

"During the rains last week, our roof leaked, flooding the upstairs, causing drywall damage downstairs, along with damage to two pedestals on a table. We had been told the roof was fixed, it was not," Lambert said, adding how pandemic-reduced rent repayments have nearly crippled her gallery. She also spoke of parking issues and how the spaces at her end of the site have given over to businesses and as such, she regularly has to deal with complaints.

"I love Bergamot, I do not want to leave. I have been in business for 30 at Bergamot, I do not plan on retiring as I love what I do ... We need you to help us survive by lowering our CAM charges significantly. By only offering one year leases it is almost impossible to attract anyone to take over part of the spaces," Lambert said, before adding, "Why are we not listed on the Santa Monica website?"

The request to direct the City Manager to create an economic support program originated from Councilmembers Oscar de la Torre and Jesse Zwick. Councilmember Gleam Davis raised the question of whether creating this program would interfere with the housing element and potentially

undermine the California Department of Housing and Community Development.

"We have a contractual obligation with the state to deliver affordable housing on Bergamot and what we have allocated across all of our city owned properties, about 150 units per acre. So for the Bergamot properties that does result in about 707 units of housing, which we do have an obligation to deliver on," City Manager David White responded.

Support for this issue was undeniably positive from every member of council. "We've been trying to work with Bergamot for a while with the CAM charges [and] the quality of life issues for the businesses over there," Councilmember Christine Parra said.

"We tout ourselves as a cultural art center, but here we are, they're begging and we're still in the midst of an economic recovery. And so I think that it behooves us to do what we can, to do what we can to lift them up. And so I think that we really need to look at this very deeply, to be able to make it work," Parra said.

Zwick moved the item with the additional recommendation that Council directs the City to "begin the long term planning process for the site. And we do that not just with an eye towards accommodating future and current residents and others who might live there, but accommodating galleries, whether it's at that site or at other potential sites in our city."

The motion was seconded by de la Torre and passed unanimously.

from Ukraine, the idea that we're going to let NATO begin to split is totally against the interests of the United States of America and it is against our word we've given ... all the way back to Eisenhower," Biden told reporters Sunday.
