



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Boys and Girls Club of Santa Monica to leave longtime Lincoln facility and sell property



CLUB: After decades in Downtown Santa Monica, the club will move to an as yet unidentified location while it pursues a sale of its property on Lincoln Blvd.

For over 60 years, the Boys and Girls Clubs of Santa Monica (SMBGC) facility at 1220 Lincoln Blvd. has become a true bedrock of the Santa Monica community, serving children across the city through after school and summer programs. Heading into the clubs' 80th year in the city, the organization will be transitioning from its iconic location to a to-be-determined modernized facility. The nonprofit has recently announced plans to sell the land parcels on Lincoln that houses a club and its administrative offices, and will eventually relocate to a new facility within the city. Both the selling and relocation processes are running concurrently, and the transition began in January when elementaryaged students shifted after school program attendance to their respective school campuses.

SMBGC Chief Executive Officer Brynja Seagren stated that a number of options were

considered for the Lincoln location over the past four years, with in-depth analysis and expert consultation resulting in a decision to move facilities rather than make renovations to the older facility. Seagren added that the "heart of the decision" was a "commitment" to be in places where kids are located, determining that the group cannot serve as many kids in Downtown Santa Monica as in other potential spots.

"We really looked at the demographics of the community ... and it just didn't appear like anytime in the near future, there would actually be enough kids for us to serve in that facility," Seagren told the Daily Press. "We have this huge, exciting opportunity with the support of our board to say, what does the next 80 years look like? Where do we want to be? What do we want the building to look like and how can we best serve the needs of kids in Santa Monica? So (it's) definitely rooted in kids, definitely rooted in data, a lot

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

Pier marks starting point for two incredible cross-country journeys

The sun rising on Santa Monica Friday morning will also act as the dawn of daunting tasks, as two top athletes will be expending energy to traverse across America for important causes.

Beginning at the Santa Monica Pier at 8 a.m., both Andrew Linder and Paul Johnson will take the first steps in their respective journeys spanning 3,000-plus miles, heading from the beachside views to the Big Apple. Linder's "Pier to Park" trek will cover from the Pier to New York City's Central Park, and will be the first cross-country run completed with a 15-pound weighted vest attached, adding awareness to the fight against human trafficking. Johnson will be running with pace in mind in an attempt to break a world record of a 42-day pace for the 3,000 miles, also poised to be completed in NYC, and will be running to raise attention to military veteran wellness.

Linder, a former college football player, noted that his sport didn't necessitate running more than a mile, and that long distance is a "whole new world" for him, brought upon by a challenge from his father to sign up for a marathon.

"I was humbled immensely by how hard it was and how much I didn't like it," Linder said. "So I just wanted to keep working on it and keep striving to make progress."

His progress was steady, eventually competing in both a 12-hour endurance race and a 100-mile race within the past year, and was thinking about what to do next when he got in contact with Sisters Rising Worldwide, an organization dedicated to human trafficking prevention initiatives and protective services. The fight against trafficking and child sexual predators was the impetus for Linder's current employment in law enforcement, making the partnership with Sisters Rising a natural one.

"I want to be able to bring both the (running and trafficking awareness) worlds together and thought about an idea that could captivate a lot of people, and inspire a lot

of people, and I know that it would get the attention ... being able to partner up with a charity like Sisters Rising who does amazing work ... it was really a no-brainer," Linder stated.

Adding the 15-pound vest to the mix hasn't impacted the amount of miles put in during Linder's training, but it has forced him to "get comfortable" with the accessory through long walks and hikes. He added that he's lost eight pounds during the training so that there isn't "an overwhelming amount" of weight on his body over the 78-day trek.

The run will consist of 40-mile days that will take Linder into California, Arizona, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Missouri, Kansas, Indiana, Illinois, Ohio, West Virginia, Pennsylvania, New Jersey and New York. He said that the Pier was chosen as a starting point for its iconic status and fair weather, adding that he hopes the climate will shift into more mild conditions in the midwest and east as he traverses throughout the spring.

Linder added that many don't know the full extent of the trafficking issue, as the International Labour Organization estimates that over 24.9 million individuals are forced into labor and sexual exploitation. He hopes that his run can spread the word about the issue that impacts every stretch of the nation, and specifically increase education about the more cyber-based recruiting into trafficking scenarios.

"(It's about) educating younger people about how to be safe and how to be aware of your surroundings, I think that's a big thing especially (since) the internet plays such a major part of what's going on," Linder said. "I think when we were younger, our parents would scare us (about) the man in the white man, but that man in the white van is now on the internet and everyone has access to it ... just (educate) on how to be smart because the internet's not going away."

Like Linder, Johnson didn't truly embrace the competitive running scene until recently. An officer in the United States Navy, he picked up the activity in the summer of 2022 while

Vice Mayor Lana Negrete announces cancer diagnosis

Tuesday's City Council meeting included some extremely sad news as Vice Mayor Lana Negrete confirmed that she has been diagnosed with cancer. Many residents of Santa Monica were already aware as Negrete first posted the news a few days ago on her Facebook (/lana.fernandeznegrete) and Instagram (/lananegrete) channels.

'This is especially important for me and I will admit that I did not know that February was National Cancer Prevention Month until now," she said on Tuesday evening. "Many of you may know already as I've been very vocal, I was just recently diagnosed with cancer. And so I am going to be using my platform as much as possible to be vocal about all things surrounding cancer."

Five days ago, on 24 February, Negrete said, "Shit just got real," adding, "This diagnosis puts you in a place of really magnifying what's important and letting go of what's not.

In the first of several videos posted on her social media profiles, she said, "They are gonna fight my cancer with the BIG GUNS ... You got this, they say. You'll be fine, they say. At least we've got all this medical advancement, they say. Yes yes, but this shit is real and until you are faced with signing away pages of side effects that can kill you to keep you alive from the thing that can kill you, you will never know."

In front of gathered councilmembers and Santa Monica residents in chambers at City Hall, Negrete said that National Cancer Prevention Month was first observed in 2014 and has since been recognized every

February. "The goal is to educate the public about the importance of cancer prevention and early detection," she said.

According to the American Cancer Society, about 1.8 million new cancer cases

are expected to be diagnosed in the US in 2024. However, studies have shown that up to 50% of cancer cases and deaths are preventable through healthy lifestyle choices and early detection.

"By raising awareness and promoting healthy habits, the National Cancer Prevention Month aims to reduce the number of cancer cases and deaths in the future. So my personal message to you out there is ladies, get your mammograms and advocate for yourself. Young ladies and boys. Know your body and advocate for yourself. Guys get your prostate checked. Everybody check your colon," Negrete said, before ending on, "I think it's really important that we listen to our bodies, we show up to our doctor's appointments when we can and everybody stay safe and healthy. And hopefully we can prevent cases like myself. Thank you."

Mayor Phil Brock echoed what every single individual in the City of Santa Monica was thinking, "We wish you the absolute best in this fight and we know Vice Mayor Negrete, that you are a fighter. You will beat this.'

Negrete has said she will continue to be as vocal as she can about her experience, so that everyone can learn. "This journey is years long, not just the few months of chemo, surgery and radiation but the years of meds and scan / recurrence anxiety. So yes, I'm gonna fucking kick this fucking cancer's ass."

L.A. Opera "Dwarfs" Stage

"JACARANDA, SHAWN PHILLIPS!" was the headline I chose for my previous NOTEWORTHY column. Seems ironic now, because: I was a big fan of Phillips when he surfaced in the early '70s, with that mystical voice and guitar effects, and thought-provoking words, but when he played McCabe's last week he brought along eight electric guitars (and played every one, flipping them back and forth like a stoner not sure which dessert to linger over next) and a suitcase full of gadgets plugged into them. He told us he had never had such problems with the setup before, but even if it had worked perfectly, it sacrificed what I consider to be his special talents. I know, great artists don't keep repeating themselves, but you can explore new territory without losing your way.

This show, well-received, was a classic example of the gamble that live music always is. I've seen Van Morrison half a dozen times and the performances ranged from disappointing to cosmic. You just never know. And so, you must go. You will miss out on every great show you considered, but decided against.

And, I was very excited to take in the double concerts by Jacaranda on Sunday. A superb program, with great artists. Bound to be memorable. But as I sat in my car ready to head over, I realized that the flare up of a painful hip malady left me too vulnerable at the moment. And – it was their final concert after a groundbreaking and consistently excellent 20 years of performances, most at our First Presbyterian Church downtown. (Great acoustics and sight lines.) The highest praise goes out to leader Patrick Scott, and his crew and musicians., in particular The Lyris Quartet. They will be missed.

HIGHLY RECOMMENDED:

"HIGHWAY 1, USA"/"THE DWARF," LA OPERA – Not "La Traviata" or "Turandot" so I can't speak from the experience of having seen them, but while you are waiting for those two, in April and May, this should satisfy your soul for big voices, great acting, big sets and fine music. I can say this: in seven years of seeing almost everything our LA Opera has produced, I have never been disappointed. And this production has racked a few rave reviews, including LA Times and NY Times. Sun 2 p.m., Wed 7:30 p.m., Dorothy Chandler Pavilion, LA, \$24-259.

HOT CLUB OF LOS ANGELES – You can go to the Cinema Bar any Monday, 9 - 11:30, for more than a decade now, and hear these hot players run through Django Reinhart-style '30s jazz. They should have copies of their new album "Nova" there for sale. Mon 9 p.m., Cinema Bar, Culver City, no cover.

RECOMMENDED:

"BOB MARLEY: ONE LOVE" – I can recommend this based on the story it tells and the trailers I've seen, and the fact that none of my hardcore reggae friends has trashed it. But none have raved, either. It does cover only a small period in his short

Porcelain from Versailles: Vases for a King & Queen

This exhibition brings together two of the most extraordinary surviving sets of vases owned by King Louis XVI and Queen Marie-Antoinette of France during the late 1700s. The vases are among the highest achievements of the Sèvres porcelain manufactory made before the French Revolution, becoming personal treasures of the royal family at the time. They were initially kept at the Palace of Versailles outside Paris, the royal family's primary residence, and are a testament to the exemplary skills of the artists who took part in their creation. KITCHEN: The food is good but the atmosphere is a little overwhelming.

When I read spectacular reviews about FUNCKE restaurant in Beverly Hills I tried to get a reservation but that was too tough for me, so I decided to try a more local restaurant with the same owner - Felix Trattoria in Venice.

When I got there, I realized that the space was where Joe's restaurant, a local favorite years ago, used to be located. We were promptly seated after some argument

about being seated before everyone was there, and we waited for our friends to arrive.

As in so many restaurants it was too loud to comfortably converse, and the chairs were uncomfortable. We didn't like the ambiance, and if we hadn't had friends meeting us, we probably would have left.

Eventually our friends arrived, and the waitress gave us an informative speech about the restaurant's concept: Portions are large to be shared family style. Then I looked at the wine list. I didn't see any bottles under \$100, and none of the inexpensive Rhône wines or Tuscan wines I like to order in pasta based restaurants. So, I asked to speak with the wine steward. He showed up right away and was friendly and helpful and we ended up with a wine that was unfamiliar to me but for \$85 not bad. I didn't see it on the wine list.

We ordered a couple of appetizers and two

main courses to share. One of the appetizers was grilled artichokes, much like served in the Jewish quarter in Rome, only these were better! A "Caesar-like" salad also showed up and it too was very good.

Then the two pasta dishes arrived, and they were both excellent. One was the recommended house specialty, with a mild lemon flavor, and the other was a wonderful duck pasta, like no other I've had in

Los Angeles.

If you're a young person with a good appetite, and not sensitive to noise, you can have a wonderful dinner at this restaurant. But since I like to bring my wines to Italian restaurants, the \$75 corkage fee is a no-go for






