Comedians to take wise crack at superstardom at local festival

This April 1, there's no fooling about what the center of the city's comedy scene will be.

Starting on the hijinx-filled date through April 6, The Crow at the Bergamot Station Arts Center hosts the Bergamot Comedy Festival, featuring performer showcases and free educational panels fronted by leaders in the comedy and entertainment industries. The week-long festival was a partnership between local, regional and national groups; including City of Santa Monica Cultural Affairs, Santa Monica Travel and Tourism, the Los Angeles Times and MasterClass.

Crow VP of Communications Daphne Ruiz said the endeavor has "been a labor of love" and something they've "always kind of had in the back of our mind," something Crow Founder Nicole Blaine agreed with, particularly holding an event of this magnitude at Bergamot.

I feel like this really hits with what Bergamot Station Arts Center was made to be," Blaine said. "It (is) supposed to be a collective of community, celebrating the arts, and there is supposed to be programming here that is free, that is vibrant, and that represents the voices from all the different walks of life ... I feel really honored that I'm doing the work in my hometown, in a place that I grew up seeing art."

Blaine took inspiration for the festival by attending many of her own as a standup wanting to learn more about her trade. The panels, with subjects such as breaking into comedy clubs and how to write for late-night television, were curated

Heath adds emotional layer to all-time physique with new documentary

Being a leader of one's profession comes with much adulation, but even more pitfalls attempting to stay on top. This occurs especially in the realm of athletics, where the mental toll is only exacerbated by constantly pushing the body to its limits.

Not many know more about being on top, and about stress on the physical form, than seven-time Mr. Olympia champion bodybuilder Phil Heath. Faced with a crossroads in his athletic career after an end to his time on the basketball court, Heath was inspired by all-time greats like Arnold Schwarzenegger and Jay Cutler to become a beast in the gym and the competitive ranks, but not without struggle. For a long time, his hulking frame hid a layer of vulnerability, one Heath finally was ready to share with the world in the new documentary "Breaking Olympia."

"Breaking Olympia," much like Heath's seven Mr. Olympia titles, is an uncommon feat, being the rare documentary distributed by a major movie studio, Universal Pictures. Produced by Dwayne "The Rock" Johnson's company Seven Bucks Productions and directed by Brett Harvey, the newly-released film chronicles the bodybuilder's rise to superstardom and the surrounding ramifications of fame.

"They provided opportunity to really show Phil, not just Mr. Olympia," Heath told the Daily Press during a media scrum at the famous Gold's Gym in Venice,

Former Los Angeles Deputy Mayor Raymond Chan convicted in sprawling bribery case

Former Los Angeles Deputy Mayor Raymond Chan was convicted Wednesday of racketeering, bribery, fraud and giving false statements to investigators in a sprawling payto-play corruption scandal at City Hall.

The federal jury reached the guilty verdict less than 24 hours after lawyers finished closing arguments, the Los Angeles Times reported.

Sentencing was set for June 10. Chan's attorney, John Hanusz, told the judge that they will appeal.

"Chan used his leadership position in City Hall to favor corrupt individuals and companies willing to play dirty," U.S. Attorney Martin Estrada said in a statement. "With today's verdict, we send a strong message that the public will not stand for corruption and that pay-to-play politics has no place in our community."

This was Chan's second trial in the bribery case involving downtown Los Angeles real estate development projects. The first fell apart after his lawyer, Harland Braun, was hospitalized and unable to return to work for months. A judge declared a mistrial last April.

In the latest trial, Assistant U.S. Attorney Brian R. Faerstein told jurors that Chan and former City Councilmember Jose Huizar used the downtown real estate boom of the prior decade to enrich themselves and their allies, the Times reported.

Faerstein described Chan, 67, as a crucial intermediary between Chinese developers looking to build high-rises and Huizar, who headed the powerful committee that shepherded such projects.

In opening arguments March 12, Faerstein said Chan "got bribes for himself, and he got bribes for other public officials."

Chan is the last defendant charged in the City Hall corruption investigation to go on trial. Huizar, who pleaded guilty to racketeering and tax evasion charges, was sentenced in January to 13 years in prison. More than a half-dozen others have been convicted or pleaded guilty to federal charges, including Huizar's brother, Salvador Huizar. Chan used

"This case was, and always has been, about Jose Huizar," Hanusz said.

Hanusz agreed that Huizar and the others were corrupt. But he said while Huizar accepted flights to Las Vegas, casino chips and lavish hotel stays, Chan received none of those things.

Chan, while working with developers, was motivated not by greed but by a desire to make Los Angeles more business-friendly, Hanusz said.

Chan was the top executive at the Department of Building and Safety until 2016, when he became the deputy mayor in charge of economic development under Mayor Eric Garcetti, who was not implicated in the scandal. Chan held that job for slightly more than a year, then left city government to become a private-sector consultant, representing real estate developers.

Prosecutors have accused Chan of secretly setting up a consulting firm while working for the city and overseeing government actions for which he was paid by a developer after he left his city employment, the Times said.

Osteria Del Fornaio

PIZZA: Merv Hecht recently traveled to Osteria Del Fornaio on Wilshire Blvd.

My friend and I decided we wanted Chinese food for dinner, so we went to the Lotus on 4th and Wilshire. You might remember that I wrote a favorable review of it a few months ago (it seems like last week). We arrived there to find it had closed - so much for Chinese food near the ocean! I heard a rumor recently that it will re-open as a Korean steak house. That will be nice - stay tuned.

We were pretty hungry, so we saw a new restaurant across the street and decided to go there. I had seen it for a while but hadn't tried it yet. We were pleasantly surprised. The room was light and airy with high ceilings, and tables around a long table where large groups could sit (and did while we were there) with good spacing between the tables. That reminded me a bit of Basque restaurants where single people sat at a large table and mingled with others. Did you know there used to be a Basque restaurant in Santa Monica? In any event this is a beautiful restaurant and there are two patios outside, one covered and one open air. This will be a terrific venue if Santa Monica ever heats up.

I saw some good looking pizza coming out of the open view kitchen, but we decided on pasta. Both pasta dishes were excellent, and we were too full for dessert. The menu was pretty standard for Santa Monica Italian restaurants, but there is a chef's special menu each week. There are so many Italian restaurants in Santa Monica that it's hard to find one that has something special that makes it worth going to. This restaurant has very few reviews on the internet, is not open for lunch, and doesn't have anything on the menu not available in at least one or two dozen restaurants nearby. When I say something special, or different, I mean something like the duck ragu pasta I had at Felix a few weeks ago.

The food and service here is good, it has a nice setting, and the prices are middle of the road. They have an excellent drink menu although the wine list is average. If find myself nearby one night when I'm hungry I'll probably stop in, and perhaps have one of the very attractive courses on the menu, such as the Grilled Cauliflower, the Pollo ai Funghi (\$34), or the Costata al Pepe (ribeye steak in brandy sauce \$49). All of these dishes look very good on the menu. But I might end up at one of the other 200 Italian restaurants in town.



with curious questions in mind, as Blaine wanted an environment to ask anything, even baseline questions that may be embarrassing to ponder otherwise.

"I think the majority of people in this industry are always of service, and they always want to help," Blaine added. "So everything with this festival is coming from the point of view of, what does a comic need to know equitable education, to me, is one of the most fabulous ways to jumpstart anyone's career."

The industry veterans taking part in the festival range from showrunners like Netflix's "Survival of the Thickest" creator Danielle Sanchez-Witzel, to writers like NBC's "Night Court" scribe Mathew Harawitz. Late-night television expertise will be taught by "The Tonight Show Starring Jimmy Fallon" creative consultant Michael Cox, who said the festival "is an excellent opportunity for not only comedians, but for the industry to scout."

Another high-profile guest is Andrew Reich, who served as executive producer on arguably comedy's all-time greatest television hit, "Friends." Having friends in the industry has paid off for Blaine, and will also pay dividends for festival attendees.

"The coolest part about the entertainment community is it is a community, and when I react out to a top agent and say, would you be willing to speak and share you knowledge, they do," Blaine said. "They say yes, because ... it's going to make their job easier, because if they can connect with the up and coming artists, and tell them what they want, then they're going to be able to give that (to) a network ... there's a mutually beneficial experience that comes out of all of this."

There will be no shortage of talent to pluck from, as the fest provides the opportunity for diverse perspectives to shine. The week's lineup is 50% female and nonbinary identifying, aiming to cultivate an empathetic community via good humor. After the public panels in the early evening, showcases take place at The Crow featuring comedians such as Nina Nguyen, Haley Warren and Bee Gutierrez.

Blaine stated she opened The Crow to find

out how to participate in "society moving forward with using storytelling," and believes she found 50 worthy comedians that will "make it better" for the next generation of women, people of color and the LGBTQ+community.

"The truth is that storytelling is still one of the most powerful ways to serve social justice, and when we get those diverse points of view on (big platforms) ... (people) all of a sudden understand the perspective of someone who is clear and artistic and has (had) crimes (committed) against them for gender and sexuality, and you all of a sudden care about them because the storytelling is so profound," Blaine said

Along with the panels and showcases, the festival also includes private perks for ticket holders, including group yoga, group tarot reading and more in-depth panel discussions. The April 1 opening night also has the "Tomorrow's Ladies of Late Night" finalist showcase and an opening party. April 5 is "mental health day" sponsored by Comedy Gives Back, with the day's private perk being mediation and mental health programming.

The festival was made possible in part with support from Art of Recovery, a Cultural Affairs initiative, a show of solidarity between Santa Monica government and Bergamot. In a February meeting of Santa Monica City Council, councilmembers voted unanimously to create an economic support program for the center, and much of the public made their voices heard in supporting Bergamot.

"It was really, really touching," Ruiz said. "It was amazing to see the community come out and support and really see the value of having a community-centric art space. If the community hadn't come out and supported that, who knows what they would have turned that space into. Instead of only looking toward commercially viable spaces, (this is) really making that (safe space) for art galleries and art spaces such as ours."







also attended by his friend and legendary actor Dolph Lundgren. "Everybody else was always (asking), tell us about what it's like to be the champ, tell us about the protein (and) training. I'm like, yeah, that's cool, but what about me? I'm not gonna always be that guy, and I also went through my levels of hardship (in) how I grew up ... they were willing to capture that and really willing to offer me an opportunity to peel back those layers."

Working alongside Harvey on the documentary was producer Adam Scorgie, and the crew was able to win over both Heath and wife Shurie by wanting to get "behind the human" who produced inhuman feats on

stage.
"I had met Lou Ferrigno as a kid, me and my dad shared some moments (going) through these magazines, (and) you're like, 'oh my God ... is that even real? How do you get your back that big?' So when Phil gave me this opportunity, and obviously seeing the great career he had established ... I (said) 'yeah, let's do it," Scorgie added.

Before his all-time career in bodybuilding, there was Phil Heath the basketball player, who excelled in his native Seattle area at Rainier Beach High School, playing alongside future NBA star Jamal Crawford. Heath said that basketball in Seattle is "everything," attracted to the sport because of the access to practice individually.

"I was always a stickler for selfimprovement, and being able to finally get your shot right and hear a swish, you don't get to hear that with football ... with basketball, you can visually see the ball go through that net and hear it," Heath said. "You can hear it go off the glass, you can hear it go around the rim ... basketball really was just everything for me."

The sport was Heath's life, until it wasn't. He saw his playing time diminish while attending the University of Denver, eventually coming to the conclusion that he needed a new endeavor. Heath noted that he understands what young athletes in team sports are going through, and that even if their dreams of big-time contracts and endorsements are cut short, they should focus on gratitude for the opportunity of getting a quality education and should ask questions about their future to coaches and peers.

"For all those athletes that are going through it, you got to remind yourself that you have s spark, you have light ... you got to continue to work hard, no matter where you

go, because you're gonna get in the real world (and) be dealing with similar challenges," he said. "And if you can ... manage your emotions and your ability to communicate at 20 years old, or 18, once you get (to) 25-30, you're going to be a great employee or entrepreneur ... you're going to be an asset, because (employers) need people that are highly aware of themselves."

Growth of awareness and emotional intelligence came even while Heath was racking up consecutive Mr. Olympia crowns, the highest honor in bodybuilding. In "Breaking Olympia," Heath speaks his raw emotions about losing his father to illness as well as various injuries that took him away from the number-one spot. He said that the documentary is a chance to speak out for other athletes who have to deal with emotions of depression, anger and frustration.

"There's way too much of our love in there," Scorgie added. "I'm crying on premiere days. We care about the subject, we care about the film, and I think that just resonates with the people we're working with ... they share themselves (because we're) in the trenches with (them)."

In the trenches with the filmmakers were fellow icons of bodybuilding, such as Cutler and Ronnie Coleman, as well as box office breaker Johnson. Heath said that his peers were "open" to the project and he appreciated that they "actually cared enough" to pour themselves into a film despite not knowing the final outcome.

Another peer that cares for Heath is Schwarzenegger, with the superstar recognizing Heath's accomplishments and building a bond. Heath's seventh Mr. Olympia title in 2017 tied the Austrian Oak on the all-time champions list, and Heath spoke glowingly of the former California governor at the Gold's Gym he still frequents in his 70s.

"I definitely realize who I'm tied with," Heath said. "It's just inspirational to be able to look at Arnold at his events and him know my name, but then also we can train together, we can hang out. He's my muse ... being around people like that, when you're around greatness, it rubs off, and it's rubbed off on me in many different ways. Watching his trajectory, it just lets you know that there are no limitations, just the ones in your mind."
